The Governor's Office of Agriculture Policy has awarded Agriculture Development Funds to Clark County for the 2019 CAIP (County Agriculture Investment Program). The program offers eleven investment areas providing farmers with incentives, allowing them to improve and/or diversify their current production practices. Incentives are offered on a 50/50 matching basis, upon the investment area(s) completion. Maximum local cost share is \$3,500. Must be 18 to apply.




Kentucky Cost Share Program
