The Governor's Office of Agriculture Policy has awarded Agriculture Development Funds to Clark County for the 2020 CAIP (County Agriculture Investment Program). The program offers eleven investment areas providing farmers with incentives, allowing them to improve and/or diversify their current production practices. Incentives are offered on a 50/50 matching basis, upon the investment area(s) completion. Maximum local cost share is \$3,000. Must be 18 to apply.




## **Kentucky Cost Share Program**

The Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program was created to help agricultural operations protect the soil and water resources of Kentucky.



In early 2016, Tim and Adrienne Duvall purchased 1/2 of the Stafford Farm on Wills Rupard Road. In late 2016, Jim and Diane Tipton purchase the other 1/2 of the farm with a desire to keep the farm intact as family owned and operated, like Mr. Stafford had accomplished for nearly 5 decades. Tim and Adrienne currently manages 400 acres running a beef cow/calf operation with 100 cows, while having full time careers and two young daughters.

To address water and soil quality issues, they have installed 4,300 feet of interior fence for rotational grazing. To increase water distribution, they established 2,500 feet of water line with gravity fed and city water tanks and fenced off 4 ponds. They maintain their pastures of legumes and grasses by focusing on maintaining soil health through annual soil testing and pasture renovation. To accommodate cattle, holding, sorting and working pens were added.


These improvements were accomplished with local grant money received through the Agriculture Development Fund—County Agriculture Investment Program (CAIP) and Federal cost share through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). These improvements will help ensure the farm operates with optimum grazing and sufficient water supply while preserving the land.

## Outstanding Individual Bill Shearer

Bill received his Agricultural Economics degree from the University of Kentucky in May of 1972. He is also a graduate of the School of Banking of the South and the Kentucky School of Banking. He currently manages a 650 acre cow/calf operation and produces his own hay. Bill worked in the banking industry for 36 years while continuing to farm with his father. He has served on the Clark Energy Cooperative and East Kentucky boards since 2005. Bill has served in the following community organizations: Past President of the Clark County Extension Council, Clark County Fair Board, and the Winchester Lions Club. He has been a member of the Kentucky Beef Cattle Association, Clark Regional Medical Center board, Clark County Habitat for Humanity, Clark County Extension District, board, Clark



County Livestock/Forage Council, Winchester Clark County Industrial Authority and Winchester Clark County Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors from 1994-2000 and chairman in 1997.. Bill is a lifetime alumni of the University of Kentucky and a member and elder of the Winchester First Christian Church. ## **Clark County Fallen Animal Livestock Removal**

Each year the District receives grant money through the Kentucky State Cost Share Environmental Grant and the Agriculture Development Fund to Subsidize the Clark County Fiscal Court's Fallen Animal Livestock Removal Program. Improper disposal of animal carcasses can contaminate water sources and spread disease. The program provides free fallen animal pickup by Countryside Industries to Clark County Producers so they can be disposed of properly.
