The Governor's Office of Agriculture Policy has awarded Agriculture Development Funds to Clark County for the 2018 CAIP (County Agriculture Investment Program). Incentives are offered on a 50/50 matching basis, upon the investment area(s) completion. Maximum local cost share is \$3,000. Must be 18 toapply.

Outstanding Agribusiness Boonesboro Animal Clinic

Dr. Barry Lynn Skaggs opened the Boonesboro Animal Clinic in the spring of 1977 and has been practicing both large and small animal veterinary medicine for 41 years. Dr. Mary Engelbrecht worked 35 years to develop an enormous small animal clientele while Dr. Richard English devoted 25 years to the improvement of large animal health management programs. Over the years, the clinic has hosted 34 preceptor interns. Currently, the clinic employs 5 veterinarians and 10 staff. The clinic has had an overwhelming positive impact on our farming community.

Master Conservationist Gene Barber

Gene Barber owns and rents over 1,625 acres of farmland in Cark County. He operates a successful feeder operation while still enhancing natural resources through conservation practices. Gene maintains his pastures by applying the recommended soil test nutrients and avoids forage loss by utilizing 3 hoop barns. He maintains soil and water quality by fencing off ponds, constructing heavy use livestock feeding areas and installing automatic waterers. Gene's desire to conserve natural resources is exceptional.


